I am grateful on behalf of everyone in the parish, to Pat Mansfield & Ann Harris who have represented our Parish at the meeting. The clergy will have the similar meeting at the extra-ordinary Deanery meetings, called by Bishop Mark. We are privileged to host one of those meetings with a few parishes together, for our area on Feb. 20th.Kindly take not of the date. The Open Listening Meeting & Station Mass will be here on February 20th at 5pm., followed by Lenten Station Mass.

## HOLY SEASON OF LENT- LENT IS A TIME OF CONVERSION & FREEDOM, A FLASH OF NEW HOPE:



"When our God reveals Himself, His message is always one of freedom," Pope Francis says in the opening of his Message to the faithful for Lent 2024. Recalling the Exodus of the Hebrew people from Egypt, the Holy Father explains that our journey through the desert can be a season of grace – not an abstract journey, but a concrete path that involves seeing the world as it is and hearing the cries of our oppressed brothers and sisters. He insisted on the need to counter a "globalisation of indifference." He advised, "Our Lenten journey will be concrete if we realize that

even today we remain under the rule of Pharoah. A rule that makes us weary and indifferent. A model of growth that divides us and robs us of our future." At the same time, Pope Francis reminded us that it is God who takes the initiative. Too often, he said, there remains within us "an inexplicable longing for slavery," a desire to cling to idols that paralyse us, as Israel was paralysed in the desert. Lent, however, is a "season of grace, a time of conversion," where the desert can become "a place where our freedom can mature in a personal decision not to fall back into slavery," where "we find new criteria of justice and a community with which we can press forward on a road not yet taken." ... Lenten journey involves a struggle. It is a time for action, the Pope said, but also a time "to pause" – to pause in prayer and to pause "in the presence of a wounded brother or sister... Love of God and love of neighbour are one love, the contemplative dimension" of Lent can help us "release new energies," to be "more sensitive to one another: in the place of threats and

enemies, we discover companions and fellow travellers." Lent is a flash of new hope... to the extent that this Lent becomes a time of conversion, an anxious humanity will notice a burst of creativity, a flash of new hope. Calling on the faithful to "be ready to take risks," he invited them "to find the courage to see our world, not as in its death throes, but in a process of giving birth; not at the end, but at the beginning of a great new chapter of history... Faith and charity take



hope, this small child, by the hand. They teach her to walk, and at the same time, she leads them forward."

ASH WEDNESDAY: Ash Wednesday is the doorway into our Lenten season of renewal – a day rich in associations and symbolism. It marks the beginning of Lent – a time for turning again to the practice of our faith, in prayer, self-denial (fasting) and practical generosity (almsgiving). Although it is not a Holy Day of Obligation, many Catholics consider it important to receive ashes on this day. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of a period of 40 days (Sundays excluded) in which Catholics prepare for Eastertide. This period also represents the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert as well as the 40 years that the Israelites spent in exile. The ashes themselves come from the burned palms from last year's Palm Sunday celebration: thus bringing us full circle to our last celebration of the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. On Ash Wednesday, we are reminded that we are called to turn away from sin, to repent and to believe the Good News of our salvation through Jesus Christ. **RECEIVING ASHES - AN OUTWARD SIGN OF AN INNER STEP:** As we cross this threshold we customarily receive ashes on our foreheads, in the sign of the cross. This is a public mark of our turning again to God, seeking his mercy, forgiveness and help. We use these words: 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return'. Yes, we cannot pretend otherwise. Or: 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel'. Yes, we seek the one thing that is absolutely necessary: the grace of God."

MARRIAGE WEEK 2024: Marriage Week is an annual celebration offering the opportunity to support and promote marriage and family life. It is celebrated this year from 7-14 February. "National Marriage Week is an opportunity to ponder on this display of God's love for the world he created. It is a chance for married couples to reflect, perhaps with their families, on how they might develop the good things that exist between and within them. It is a time to demonstrate the value of marriage, based on sincerely lived vows, to men and women and to society as a whole. This is a week of prayer for the whole Church, in gratitude to God who has given us life and taught us to love so that we can be as he made us – a visible icon of himself. A Christian marriage is rooted in faith; that means faith in God, as the giver of life and the one promising eternal life.
